

Traffic through the village

One of the main concerns expressed through the Village Appraisal was of the volume, speed and noise of traffic through the village. We are not alone in this: many other villages in our area have similar complaints, and Ken Grimes has located some websites where these complaints are aired. One village is trying desperately to stop sat-navs directing traffic through their village. (The Observer headline was "Village pleads to be wiped off sat-nav map".)

helpful article, entitled Traffic Killing Another is Our Village, found www.speedlimit.org.uk/villagetraffic.html. In this article, the writer says that "one of the first things that should always be done when looking at traffic problems in a village is to carry out a proper survey to establish both the volume and speed of the traffic." The police have recently spent several hours monitoring the speed of traffic through the village, and so our main concern at this time is to monitor the volume. It is possible for example that, if we are experiencing a disproportionate amount of lorry traffic from outside our local area, we could apply for a weight limit, and thus limit the volume.



The Landlord Says...

It seems that everywhere you turn these days there's something or somebody willing to give you their opinion on climate change, the effects of carbon emissions on our planet and the fact that, very soon, we'll all be building igloo-kennels in our back gardens to house homeless polar bears. Regardless of your opinion on the matter, one thing is for certain: the government think it's real and therefore they're going to tax you on it.



Recently, Ken Livingstone set in place an even higher charge for driving smelly lorries in to London and the price of petrol is becoming ever more farcical. Diesel's even more expensive and don't get me started on the lunacy of hybrid vehicles. Commercial premises – like The Tharp Arms – are charged a 'climate change levy' on their electricity bills to pay for their carbon footprint and you can now visit several websites that will give you advice on how to cut your greenhouse gasses and make the place cleaner for everybody. I used one of these sites the other day, filled in the details about our appliances and the amount of kilowatts per hour of electricity we use and it told me to plant forty trees.



Don't fall foul of the law

Are you a responsible dog owner who cleans up after their dog? If yes you should be congratulated for not only helping to keep the towns and villages of East Cambridge-shire free of this offensive mess, and helping to prevent the spread of rather nasty diseases, but you should also feel rather smug in the knowledge that you are complying with the law and avoiding an unnecessary fine.



If however you are one of those irresponsible residents who believes it is not their role to pick up their own dogs mess then this warning is for you.

Walking your dog on the majority of footpaths, verges, village greens, public car parks and other such open spaces within the District means that you <u>have</u> to clear up after your dog. Spot checks of Parish areas known to experience a problem with law breaking dog walkers will be made over the coming months and we will enforce against anyone who is witnessed not clearing up after their dog. The maximum fine currently stands at £1000. Alternatively if you are seen allowing your dog to foul by either a member of the parish council or even if a member of the public reports you to us, then it is now a relatively straightforward procedure to issue you with a fixed penalty notice of £50. As more and more people become aware of the illegal nature of this rather dirty business and of the ease with which fines can be handed out, your actions could become an expensive bachabit you need to break!

News from your Local Police

POLICE COMMUNITY SUPPORT OFFICER

Metal Theft

Please report any activity that you believe is suspicious. We would rather have these reports and then send staff to investigate than miss the opportunity. If you think a crime is in progress please dial 999. Do not feel that you are wasting our time, we need to catch the people committing these crimes. Some offenders will try to use cover stories to explain their presence for being somewhere and committing crime. Do not be deterred by this if it is still suspicious. For example If it's the school holidays or you know a building has been targeted before and you see people upon the roof or around the property, even if they may look the part, and the activity appears on this basis not to be suspicious, then report this to the Police.

In one incident the Police were called to suspicious men on a roof in Histon. Officers were deployed to the scene and three young people arrested for attempting to steal lead from the roof. They will be charged. This would not have been possible without a call to the police.

Cable Theft

If you see people driving around very slowly during the day in rural locations and they appear to be paying attention to the side of the road then please report this to the Police. They may be looking for places to steal from. The Police suspect the use of 4 x 4 vehicles being used to assist in the theft of cable. If you see these near a roadside cabinet or manhole cover report this as soon as possible. Thefts of cabling occurs late evening into the early hours of the morning. If you notice your phones have gone down and you live a village environment then please use your mobile if you have one to report this to the Police. We will then be able to react properly. In Cambridge BT manhole covers were lifted between 3.30pm and 4.30pm one afternoon by men in yellow jackets posing as workman. They were not challenged, but fortunately only stole a small quantity of cable affecting no local households. BT will not routinely work on sites beyond 4pm, and only in real emergencies during the hours of darkness. Challenge suspicious behaviour by calling the police. We would rather have the information and check out an authentic workman, than not have the knowledge and suffer the theft like the one in Cambridge.

Vulnerable Locations.

The Police have identified a number of vulnerable locations. These include Churches and Schools, some of which have been targeted more than once in the past. Officers from the Neighbourhood Teams visit these locations, crime prevention advice is given, increased patrolling undertaken and overlooking properties visited to encourage suspicious activity to be reported.

You may not receive one of these visits, but may well live close to a vulnerable premises. Any Church or School with

lead on the roof is a potential target. If you see workman ask the question if they should really be there and call the police if you are unsure.

On a lighter note, if you or anyone you know is interested in setting up a neighbourhood watch scheme in your area, then please contact me so I can arrange to deliver an information pack out to you and answer any queries you may have.
