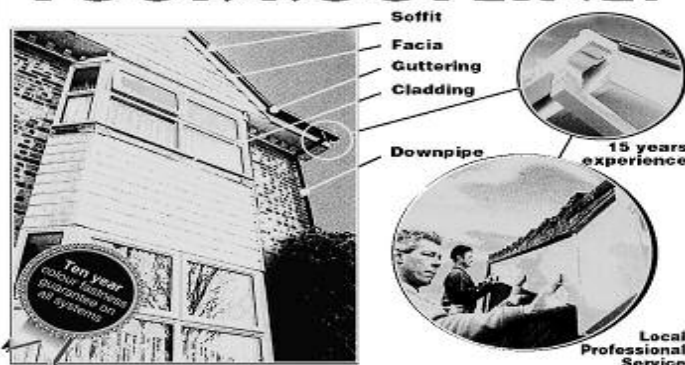

“Health Wise”

Congratulations to everyone who has managed to avoid the nasty bugs which are doing the rounds at the moment. I succumbed to a very nasty cough/cold just before Christmas which took almost three weeks to go and I know many more people are still going down with it. If you have not been caught out then do make sure you keep your immunity up by eating lots of vegetables, in particular garlic and onions. They boost the immune system to help you fight off infection as well as improve blood circulation which helps the body to work more efficiently in every way. Even if you already have caught something, increasing the amount of garlic and onions in your cooking will still help you to feel better and recover more efficiently. If you do not like eating garlic do use a good quality supplement. Soham Medical Centre has started a new service for the elderly and house-bound. They have a team of volunteer drivers who will deliver repeat medication direct to your door. If you would like your medication delivered to your home, please mark the top right-hand corner of the repeat slip with the time you want it to be delivered. Chippenham deliveries will be every Thursday. This scheme is in addition to the minibus service, not a replacement.

Recycling and rubbish

The Parish Council has recently been told that we are at last to get green sacks for garden rubbish collections. This should start in the second week of March and details should come with the new recycling calendars to be delivered shortly.

East Cambs District Council has written to all Parish Councils asking whether they would like to be a test parish for fortnightly waste collections. The Parish Councillors were not in favour of the idea, especially considering we have not even been part of the green waste collections to date.

Please continue to use the bottle, can, paper and plastic bottle banks behind the Village Hall, which help to bring in funds for the village to the tune of several £100s per year. The plastic collection bank has been slow to fill, so don't throw out those empty containers, just rinse and recycle.

The Legal Status of Cannabis

On January 29th 2004 the government re-classified the status of cannabis, reducing it from a class B drug to a class C drug. This has led to confusion about its legal status, particularly among people under the age of 18, fuelled by inaccurate reports in the national press.

Cannabis is still an ILLEGAL drug and being in possession of it continues to be an arrestable offence. The confusion that has arisen is with regard to how the police will deal with people found in possession of cannabis.

Any person found in possession of cannabis aged 17 or under WILL be arrested and dealt with by means of restorative justice. This would normally mean that a youth caught in possession of cannabis would receive a reprimand or a final warning. In certain circumstances it could mean a court appearance. Receiving a reprimand or a final warning does constitute having a criminal record and this remains with the youth until they reach 18 or for a period of five years whichever is the longer.

There will be circumstances where it is appropriate for a police officer to arrest for possession of cannabis. An example of this could include if a person is smoking cannabis in public view and/or where locally a person is known to have been repeatedly dealt with for possession of the drug. There may be circumstances such as a fear of public disorder associated with the use of cannabis, which are causing a local policing problem that cannot be effectively dealt with by other powers. Officers may arrest persons who are in possession of cannabis under circumstances that are causing a locally identified policing problem. Possession of cannabis can still lead to a maximum penalty of two years imprisonment and/or a fine.

From the Curate, Mike Banyard Tel: 721616

What a wonderful Christmas. It was tremendous to have the churches so full at both Snailwell and Chippenham over the Christmas season. Now that everyone can hear at both, we will bring more chairs next year so that more people will be able to sit down!

Christmas was followed by the terrible news from South East Asia, which has caused so much grief there, and has led to such a wonderfully generous response from so many individuals. It has been a time for reflection and thanksgiving for our own blessings. January too marks the sixtieth anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz. Reflection then, both on the power of nature and its potential for good and bad, and humankind's own tension between good and evil. One of my favourite commentators, Ronald Blythe, reflecting on this dreadful disaster puts it like this, "As I write, nature has made its desolating sea gear-change, shifting deep down its tectonic plates and causing the ocean to slop over the land. Thus, religion, politics, human achievement, love itself even, float about in watery fragments. "Our world", as the conservationists call it, has slipped out of our possession and seems no longer to be in our enlightened control. Its independence is shocking and frightening."

It is hard to imagine from this distance, enjoying a relaxing holiday, long awaited perhaps, to find that all you had left, in a distant land, were the clothes you happened to be wearing when the wave struck, and that meant just your swimming costume, as I was hearing from one survivor. So many were left that morning with absolutely nothing. Who knows how we would have reacted? Who knows, who can comprehend, the dislocation and fear? Who knows the life-long trauma, which may have resulted for so many? The minute one attempts to calculate the grief of all this, it becomes unmanageable, it is almost unbearable.

And if this disaster was a consequence of a natural tectonic plate shift, ever so slightly, in the surface of the earth, what of those unnatural human tectonic shifts in our collective memory? The slaughter on the Western Front, the "final solution" for Jews, gypsies and homosexuals, the dropping of the atom bombs, 9/11, the death camps of which Auschwitz is such a potent symbol, challenging our humanity to its core.

Can we find some inkling of God somewhere here in this disaster too? For our religion has to cope with, and has always coped with darkness and the dreadful and seemingly unanswerable. Where is God in all this? Archbishop Rowan Williams, attempting to find some meaning, said, "There is something odd about expecting that God will constantly step in if things are getting dangerous. How dangerous do they have to be? How many deaths would be acceptable?" For if our God is a God who only intervenes when all seems so bad, at what level would we expect to find him? What would be too much suffering? All 250,000? Iraq? Palestine and Israel? This drought, that civil war? Just one small child?

For our God *has* intervened in his creation, but not on our terms, and not in any ways that we might imagine. He came to us in the power and the powerlessness of the infant Christ. Christmas and Epiphany shout out to us of the God who loves, who suffers, who cries with us, who yearns for us. Let's pray that the task of rebuilding, of the resurrection even, of these devastated communities marks a tectonic shift in our view of the world, of our interconnectedness, of our mutual responsibilities, both here in these villages, in this country and across the world. Let us thank God too for all this great outpouring of love and aid.
