

## **Results of Traffic Survey**

Between 12 – 15 May we carried out a survey of the lorries which pass through Chippenham, to get an idea of how many there actually are, and whether they are local or from outside our area. If it can be shown that more than a certain number pass through the village daily, and that more than a certain percentage of them are from outside our local area, there could be a case for applying for a weight restriction.

We concentrated our efforts mainly on Tuesday and Wednesday 13 and 14 May, which happily were nice, sunny days. We found that around 200 medium and large lorries went through the village during each 13 hour period, plus about 250 small lorries / vans. We haven't yet been able to do an analysis of where they all come from, but a superficial look indicates that most are local.

We weren't specifically counting cars, but some people did, and it seems that in peak periods up to 300 cars an hour pass through the village. About half that number during the middle of the day.

Very many thanks to all who took part in the survey, and to all who offered refreshments to them! And to Mark and Alison, for letting us use The Tharp's tables as a convenient observation point.



# The Landlord Says...

I spent my teenage years growing up on the outskirts of a small village called Silverstone. Like Chippenham it is beautiful, with its own historic sense of charm. Rolling hills, farms, nearby golf courses, idyllic country lanes and plenty of rural neighbouring villages and pubs to frequent.



And a ruddy great big race track.

Once a year, this wartime airfield-cum-racing-circuit plays host to some of the world's most expensive, glamorous, beautiful and decadent race cars money can produce. At the same time, it also becomes a busier airport than Heathrow and, before the roads were improved a few years ago, there would be more people queuing through our tiny village than can be found at Terminal 5. But nobody ever moaned. My Dad and I would set out on the Thursday and buy enough food and drink to see us through a nuclear winter, let alone the weekend, and we'd spend a happy couple of days watching the motorsport activities on telly with a real live soundtrack in the background.

For the rest of the year, the circuit is used for saloon car racing, motorbikes, GP2, several single-seater formulas and Le Mans racers. Some of the major Formula One teams are based in or near the vicinity of the circuit, which they use several times throughout the year for testing.

And the noise is horrendous.

So you'll forgive me, then, for being a little blasé when I hear about complaints being made about the noise coming from Wildtracks. In nine years of living in the village, I don't think I've ever really noticed it and, having spoken to many people about it over the bar, it seems that most people aren't that bothered either.

When it comes to noise, what bothers me more is the quantity and rumble of heavy goods traffic that thunders through our pretty village on a daily basis. Motorists in vehicles of all shapes and sizes seem to use the High Street as an alternative to the Nürburgring and it's quite annoying, but if I were to focus my frustrations even further it's less the volume, or even the noise, and more the attitude and blatant disregard for the village and its residents that bothers me more.

Last week, as I walked Malachy and Jacob to the school bus, I counted nineteen lumbering great trucks thundering passed as I stood waiting to cross the road. Eventually, some generous spirit in a small hatchback slowed to a halt and indicated that I could

cross with my children; a car coming in the opposite direction did the same and away we went. But lumbering up behind my benefactor in the small hatch came a lorry, its driver clearly disgruntled at having their short cut to the A14 disrupted by a village yokel.

He nosed his truck up to the back of the small car and then leaned on the horn. I'd like to thank the driver of the car for not panicking and hitting the accelerator, for I'd surely not be here to write this now, and I'd have liked to have had the chance to express my displeasure to the lorry driver, except my five-year-old had taken off like a startled kangaroo and I was trying to make sure the boy hadn't hidden himself under the school bus in fright.

I'm pleased, then, to see the census taking place this week – as I write – to count the volume and type of traffic that uses the village. The figures I've already heard being bandied about are quite horrific and I look forward to reading the final report when it's all over. Nobody wants to prevent traffic from visiting our nice village, nor – I'm sure – do we wish to inconvenience those who need to travel this way to get from A to B, but it would be nice if something could be done to control the velocity and volume of certain types of vehicle that come this way.

Maybe then I'd be able to hear the distant noise of people enjoying themselves at Wildtracks. It would bring back pleasant childhood memories.......



# Neighbourhood Panels – local action and improvement in your area

This April saw the latest round of Neighbourhood Panels in East Cambridgeshire, with the Soham and East Panel having their 2nd meeting following on from last year's successful pilot arrangements. In fact, on the basis of the Soham and East area pilot, the District Council (ECDC) have made the pioneering decision to extend Neighbourhood Panels across the district (to give 5 Panels in all).

The Soham and East Panel met on Wednesday 2nd April in the Beechurst Hall at the Village College with 57 people present, and Councillor Derrick Beckett chairing the meeting.

There were presentations by Council Officers on Nuisance Complaints and Area Emergency Planning, and from Inspection Alan Savill on police actions, trends in crime and anti-social behaviour and the proposed priorities for the next 3 months. Following extensive discussion, involving all those present, the following priorities were agreed:

Report back from the <u>Speedwatch pilot</u> in Soham and the villages - more volunteers are needed by Cllr Joe Pattison.

#### The policing priorities were agreed as being

- Anti-Social Behaviour in Soham: High Street, Clay Street, Fountain Lane, Ten Bell Lane, Recreation Ground and by Weatherall's and in Kennett.
- ☐ Burglaries from homes of elderly residents in Fordham, Kennett and Chippenham.

Cllr Beckett confirmed that other 'issues of concern', raised by members of the public and other representatives from each Parish would receive attention within the next 3 months (to July).

Councillor Peter Cresswell, Chairman of Community Services, said: "The Panels have made great strides in dealing with the issues that have been raised so far in our area. However, we need everyone's support to make a difference, which is why we would encourage anyone with an issue to come along to the relevant meeting and see how we can deal with it."

A Newsletter summarising the outcomes from the Panel meeting will be published in mid-May, together with an invitation to (even more) members of the public to come to the next meeting (in which we hope there will be increased public participation) is on

# POLICE COMMUNITY SUPPORT OFFICER

Hello all,

I thought as our minds all turn to the holiday season, it would be a good idea to refresh our memories on how to prevent us being victims of crime whilst we are away:

Everyone needs a holiday some time, and however much you like your home, there's nothing like a change of surroundings. But you want to come home and find everything as you left it. Four out of five burglaries occur when a house or flat is empty; so don't advertise that you're away on holiday. Plan Ahead Use the checklist to help you keep your home secure. Read it and plan ahead, then tick off the items just before you go. Help from your neighbours It's also a good idea to get help from your neighbours. All you have to do is ask a friend or neighbour to keep an eye on your home while away. You could ask them to collect post left in the letterbox, and generally make the place look lived in. You can repay the favour by doing the same for them. Warn your key holding neighbour not to put your surname address or even your house number on your keys in case they fall into the wrong hands. Is there a neighbourhood watch scheme where you live? It could help you keep your home secure while you're away, and has many other Crime Prevention and community benefits. Holiday Checklist

- · Cut the lawn before you go.
- · Arrange for pets to be properly looked after.
- · Register your property on www.immobilise.com. If your property is then stolen and later recovered it would help police identify the rightful owner.
- · Cancel deliveries of milk, newspapers etc, discreetly don't announce your departure to a shop full of people. Only tell people who need to know you're going away.
- Make sure your house looks occupied. A closed curtain in the daytime makes it look as if no one is at home. It is worthwhile to get automatic time-switches to switch lights, and a radio, on and off in downstairs rooms.
- Don't leave valuable items like TV's, videos or hi-fi visible through windows.
- · Lock your garage and shed with proper security locks, after putting all your tools safely away so they cannot be used to break into your house.
- Don't have your home address showing on your luggage for the outward journey.
- · Finally lock all outside doors and windows. If you have a burglar alarm, make sure it is set and that your key holder knows how to operate it. And just before you actually set off, it's worth allowing a quiet couple of minutes on the doorstep to check you've done all you had to do and taken everything you need with you. Have a safe journey, a great holiday and return home not a victim of crime

For a while now our Neighbourhood Watch numbers in our villages appear to have dwindled. As some of our villages are quite remote I feel as if it's more important than ever that we increase the numbers again. As I have mentioned to some of you before we have looked at ways to revitalise the Neighbourhood Watch schemes and as such I have been appointed as a Neighbourhood Watch champion for the area.

I offer you all an open invitation for all of the residents of the villages that is interested in joining up for the scheme. We are looking for nominated co-ordinators to set up schemes in your area. The co-ordinators will be responsible for taking details of any problems people have in the area and passing the details onto the Police. Further to this any information that the Police have about the area and points that need to be raised about issues affecting the area can be sent to the local co-ordinator for them to pass the information onto local residents. Neighbourhood watch is a great way to share information about your local area so if any of you is interested in

setting a scheme up in your area please let me know and I will gladly welcome you and furnish you with all the information you need to set your scheme up.

Saying too much can sometimes be a problem, but not saying enough can cause an equal amount of difficulty, and our wedding couples, and all of us, can learn from our need to communicate clearly with each other. Sometimes our emotions are too strong for words to hold all the meaning of the moment, and we dissolve in tears or laughter. And often we need to choose our words with care and attention. For without that they can hurt and not build us up. And whatever our experience of human intimacy may be, God is more intimate still. God is not "trapped" by our religious practices, living just in our church buildings, but all around, at every point, for we uncover the sacred at every hand's turn. And we can talk with God, of
