

<u>HealthWise</u>

After this lovely summer we should all be well up on our vitamin D levels as this is the vitamin which we make from sunshine and which helps to keep the immune system working well throughout the colder, darker months of the year. Exposure of 10 to 15 minutes per day to sunshine is sufficient so there is no need to over-expose and run the risk of skin damage. Vitamins A, B, C, and K require among other things, green leafy vegetables so always try to include these in one meal per day. Vitamin E comes from vegetable oils, nuts and seeds - nicely included in a good quality muesli to start the day, and avocados which contain essential fatty acids so important to provide the anti-oxidants to destroy the build-up of harmful chemicals in the body and to prevent the clogging of arteries, thus helping to reduce the incidence of heart disease and stroke. Keep the intake of fresh fruits, vegetables and salads up while they are still so readily available as they contain so many nutrients essential to good

Chill out and save money!

East Cambridgeshire District Council and npower, the national energy provider, have teamed up to offer East Cambs' residents the chance to trade in their old fridge for a brand new, energy efficient model at a very reduced rate.

Fridges and fridge-freezers can be the biggest consumers of energy in the home. Old or damaged appliances have to work especially hard to keep food and drinks cold and therefore use more energy.

Fridgesavers offers low-income households the opportunity to replace their old inefficient appliance for a new A-rated refrigerator for just £35 or fridge-freezer for as little as £60. An A-rated fridge-freezer can also save up to £690 on electricity bills over the life of the appliance.

To qualify for the scheme householders must be using a damaged or faulty appliance (therefore using excess energy) and be in receipt of one or more qualifying benefits or tax credits. *Fridgesavers* works on a 'like for like' basis - a new fridge for an old fridge and a new fridge-freezer for an old fridge-freezer.

Now there's a new challenge for the autumn, with an additional word search for the older ones. All entries to the Vicarage in Chippenham by the end of October and prizes will be arriving! Thanks too to Giles Gear, Colin Twite, Tim Appleyard and Xavin Taylor who wrote to the War Graves Commission to try to find out more about the soldier buried in the war grave in Chippenham churchyard. So far, the research has uncovered his name, rank and unit; I think we will need to write to the regiment to find out more.

Autumn turns us to thoughts of harvest, even though for many, especially those who work the land, the harvest has been going on for months. It's at this season that we focus our thoughts and our prayers and thanksgiving for God's goodness in creating the earth, and our willing co-operation in making it fruitful, so that all have enough to eat. It's not so everywhere and we do well to stop and reflect on our many blessings. The book of Genesis at the start of the Bible provides a poetic account of creation, with the telling words after each section, "....and God saw that it was good." And it is, when there is enough to go around and when there is plenty. In our affluent and wealthy western world, it is good to stop and reflect on these blessings, and to turn ourselves to God and give thanks. So our harvest festivals give us that opportunity with, this year, a harvest supper in each of the two churches after the service. Do come along, give thanks and enjoy the fellowship.

Several people have asked me how the church is funded, and why we seem to be asking for money both to keep our worship alive and to maintain the costs of ministry and the superb ancient buildings which give so much character to Chippenham and Snailwell. Unlike many European countries where the state supports the church with funds, in England there is no such support. We can apply for grants to help us maintain our ancient buildings but the costs of ministry, and keeping the church ministry available for all, for regular worship, occasional services and so on falls on those who contribute regularly. Taxpayers can "gift aid" contributions which helps, but the bulk of the money comes from the individual contributions of regular worshippers.

Our beautiful churches are open every day so that we can visit, spend time in quiet reflection and prayer to God, and to give thanks for our many blessings; they are well used, and provide a warm welcome to all. Harvest is a good time to reflect on our blessings. Count them, and help us to keep both St Margaret's and St Peter's flourishing centres of worship and the development of true and lasting community.
