An alternative Match Report - Chippenham v La Hogue, 2nd Aug 2005

"Can I count on you for cricket?" Darren asked, when I say asked it was more "I am counting on you for cricket". 8 years I had managed to avoid the call but I always knew that one day it would happen. Memories of my cricket career (ended 1984) flashed before my eyes; the evening sun, the marvellous teas, the tedious hours in the field, the sound of leather on box... Ah yes, I remember now, happy days.

Of all the things Darren could have said why did he have to say that? I mean I will play on principle and I do have strong principles, if people don't like them I have plenty more but why did such an obvious appeal to my own delusional perception of self importance finally win me over so easily? Darren knew that he had me well and truly by the googlies and so I now found myself a fully press-ganged member of the Chippenham village cricket team in a match versus La Hogue to be played 2nd August 2005.

The drive home was only made more bearable by eating the very reasonably priced pie I had just purchased from La Hogue. They have a fine selection and I can recommend the venison offering or the one with an apricot on the top, however I digress. Horror of all horrors manifested itself when my wife indicated she would bring the whole family to watch my sporting Macbeth, and the denouement delivered by my son who not only felt me playing cricket would be a tremendous idea but would be closely studying my technique. I can't think which idiot told him I could play!

The day arrived. For the first time I felt confident. I had cunningly worked out that the La Hogue team would be made up by the girls in the shop plus Chris Reeks as he is the only male I have seen working there. I would knock up a quick 50, put up a dolly of a catch and be back in the pavilion in time for tea and medals. A reasonable assumption to make given the teams, and the clue is in the names <u>Chippenham</u>, made up of Chippenham villagers, <u>La Hogue</u> made up of Chris and 10 wo...MEN! Either Chris had conveniently found 10 butchers hiding behind the meringues or they were, as I now suspected, ringers. (Looking at the brown brogues I didn't realise that end of the village was inhabited by so many land agents).

Darren arrived and took instant command of his troops. Chippenham fielded first with Darren displaying the utmost confidence in his team by positioning all 9 available fielders on the boundary. Our opening bowling was inspired, keeping the runs down to a respectable few, however I wasn't convinced Chippenham were being taken seriously when the opposition Captain ambled on to the field cigarette in hand so Chippenham smoothly moved up into second gear. I worked out if the opening 6 scored their 25 runs and retired I wouldn't have to bat, so I spent the time trying amateur hypnosis on the first 6 batsmen in a vain attempt to turn them into an army of Don Bradmans. I'm not sure that it helped but the 2 openers have now quit smoking whilst 3 & 4 are now comfortable with their feminine sides. Every cloud has a silver lining.

Well would you believe it when my carefully laid plans went to pot as 3 of the first 7 retired on 25 and the other 4 let me down by getting out cheaply (apparently worried the beer was going to run out as Jim Devonport was seen nearing the pavilion). I was in. A drunken cheer from my wife went up from under the bench and my son proudly clapped me in. I strode out to the non-strikers end. My request for expert advice was met with "hit the red round thing as hard as you can with the long bit of wood". I managed to centralise plastic and leather before facing my first ball from Kevin "Jeff Thomson" Pallant who had the look of a rabid dog as he prepared to hurl down his first delivery with the precision and speed of an Exocet missile. Now I am short-sighted and can only make out objects clearly when they are reasonably close however it is truly amazing how your sight sharpens up when someone is chucking a leather ball at you from a few yards away. Confidence and adrenalin arrived in equal measure as I found myself actually hitting the ball.

No one told me that you need to have run the first 20 yards of the 22 that make up a cricket square <u>before</u> Darren hits the ball. Constantly I found myself the short bald chap to Darren's Benny Hill trying to make up ground during suicidal runs as we laid down our lives for the cause. However the inevitable happened and I walked back to the pavilion feeling relieved in that I had at least played a few strokes without actually receiving one. When Darren asks you to play, no matter how bad you are you are an equal. He builds up your confidence, makes you part of the team, allows you a few balls and then runs you out at the first available opportunity in favour of a better batsman. Now that's inspired Captaincy! At the end of a close match Chippenham negatively succeeded by 15 tantalising runs.

Cricket has never been my game and I realise it's all about getting involved & having fun so Darren thank you for asking me (Terry I am available for choir practice). I would undoubtedly play again just to have the hug my son gave me as I returned to the pavilion after my marathon innings and for the words he said to me, "Daddy you were really great". The enormous show of pride on his face showed me that despite the day being a bit of fun for me, my participation meant the world to him and although I am not a proper cricketer, in his eyes his Father still stands amongst giants and is at least for one more day, immortal.

In the next few weeks we are planning to carry out the Village Appraisal. This is being done on behalf of the Parish Council, to get a picture of what is needed in the village at this time. The last time we carried out such an Appraisal was in 1996/97, and that proved to be very valuable. For example, the Tennis Club came about as a direct result of it.

This time, our plan is as follows: in the first few days of October we will be delivering a copy of a questionnaire to each household. (If you haven't received one by 5th October, please ring either Nick Parsons on 721791, or myself on 721393.)

Please fill in the copy for your household, and return it to Nick Parsons at 18 Scotland End, by 17th October. We will then enter the information received into the computer program which has helped us develop this questionnaire, and by the end of the month we should have some preliminary results.

All questionnaires will be treated anonymously. However, since we would like in some cases to explore the questions raised in more detail, we would like the opportunity to interview some of those who have responded. If you would be willing to be interviewed, please write your name in the space provided on the questionnaire.

After we have processed this additional information, we will publish the full results in January. And who knows? By next year we may have a sumo wrestling club, or a new bus service, or? James Broad

I think I became aware more directly of how we all need each other, and how much all our actions can affect others, when we arrived at Toronto airport for our journey home in the summer, at the end a visit to friends in New York, a wedding in Canada, and a short holiday to the Niagara Falls in Ontario, and found that our flight had been cancelled!

Having left what we thought was more than enough time to get home and be ready for planned services at Snailwell and Chippenham that weekend, we found ourselves stranded at Toronto. Looking at the scenes back home in Britain of folk sleeping on the floor at Heathrow, we counted our blessings from the security and comfort of the hotel room the airline had provided, for we had to stay an extra three days. Inconvenient but scarcely a hardship, when in the weeks following we have witnessed scenes of the abandonment of New Orleans, and the devastating effects of changing weather patterns on the lives of so many. But it was awkward, and it was through the internet and the ability to communicate across the globe at the press of a button that I was able to make alternative arrangements. Many thanks to all who picked up the pieces!

Then to witness on the television so many once again facing starvation in Africa, and the temptation was to think that nothing much has changed and we might just all be at the mercy of so many forces beyond out control. And so many personal tragedies these past few months too.

Then I read in a book by the Chief Rabbi of Great Britain, Jonathan Sacks, called The Dignity of Difference, a work about globalisation and its effects and how we might react, "the assets of the world's three richest billionaires are more than the combined wealth of the 600 million inhabitants of the least-developed countries." In the face of all this I might have been tempted to despair at the apparent hopelessness of our condition and our apparent powerlessness to do anything about anything.

But I really do believe that individuals can and do make a difference. Jesus himself spoke to individuals as well as the crowds. He listened intently to each person's needs and responded to meet them, and lead them to new places. He healed the leper, the child at death's door, and the widow of Nain's son, for example. We too can find evidence of God at work in the world. The British Airways check in staff member at Toronto who, with a weary smile, asked me to pray for them! The amazing generosity of so many last Boxing Day to the tsunami in South East Asia, all who helped family, friend and neighbour during those hurricanes in America. Those who last Christmas responded to the appeal to buy something of value for those in real need, who gave a cow or part of a water well or a flock of chickens. Christian Aid this year is launching a new web site, www.presentaid.org to enable us all to give in this way. Last year several did. Why not join them? In the face of every difficulty, and some of the dreadful desolation, we can all make a difference.

At this present time when we give thanks for our many blessings at our own Harvest Festivals, let us dig deep to help those in need.
